



9 Ways To Use Padlet in Your Course

1



Establish Classroom Expectations

Develop expectations that are mutually agreed on between learners & instructor.

For example:

- What do you think are the most important qualities of a good instructor?
- ... qualities that make a successful student?

Ice-breakers/Class Introductions

Examples:

- Post a selfie and 3 things about me
- Post image & explain why chose it
- Answer "Would You Rather" questions
- 2 truths & 1 lie about themselves
- Add a greeting in your own language
- Where in the world were you born? (link to Google map)

Brainstorming

Ask learners to respond to a statement or pose a discussion question.

Helps foster learner engagement & community. Find questions asking learners to relate topic or course material to personal life particularly effective.

Learner Generated Review Questions

Learners post one or two potential multiple choice questions along with the correct answer for upcoming test.

Lots of benefits! Check for understanding, can see what learners consider important & serves as a review session. Save the Padlet as a .pdf & post on Moodle.

Reflect on Experience

Have students do an activity and report back on the experience. Can do this via text, images and/or videos.


Case Study

Present a case study, learners answer questions or provide a solution based on what they learned in the lesson.

Can be completed individually or as group. For case studies with more than one question recommend creating wall for each question. Review answers in class or add comments to the postings.

Exit Tickets

Pose a question at the end of the lesson to check for understanding or to get a sense of learners' thoughts about the lesson.

For example:

- Sum up topic or issue with newspaper-type headline.
- Write down two things you learned today.
- What is still challenging or confusing to get your mind around? (muddiest point)
- Did the group activity contribute to your understanding? Why or why not?


Concept or Mind Maps

Padlet includes a mind-mapping format called Canvas. Users can move sticky notes to create visual connections among concepts, facts and thoughts. Great for helping learners organize & synthesize information.

Also, if give this as a group activity can download into Excel to track contributions of each group member.

Tops and Tips

For presentations, create Padlet wall for peer assessment. After the presentation, students add two 'tops' and one 'tip' on the wall.

Tops are things the student did well and a **tip** could be something the student should improve the next time.



... And many more.
